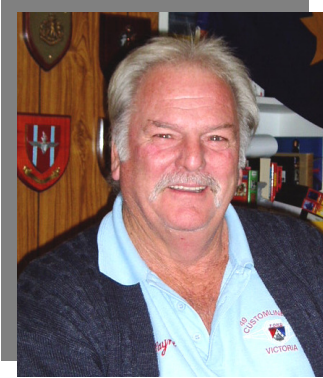

Our Public Liability Policy and the Loan of Club Property to Members.

As you can read from the letter produced at right, our Public Liability Insurer has extended our policy to cover the loan on Club Property to Members. This does not mean the Club Member is covered by the Clubs Insurance if a situation arises, it means that the Club is covered if the Clubs Property causes injury or damage to other parties. This extended cover is only applicable to immediate Club Members for their private use only. Any use of Club Property for fundraising, school or sports events will not be covered. There will be no charge for the loan of Club Property to members, the only proviso being that it is returned in the same condition as when it was loaned, and that means re-filling the gas bottle on the BBQ trailer. We will also ensure, to the best of our ability, that the property borrowed is in satisfactory working order at the time of the loan.

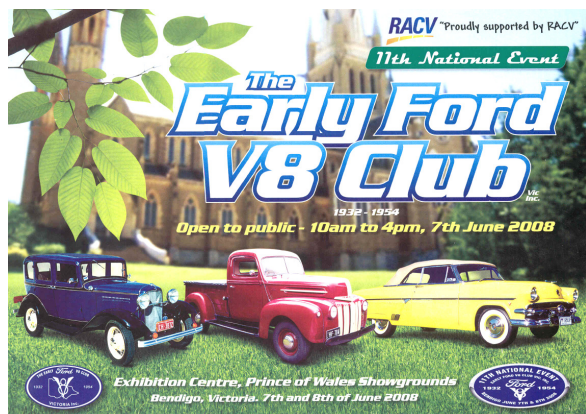

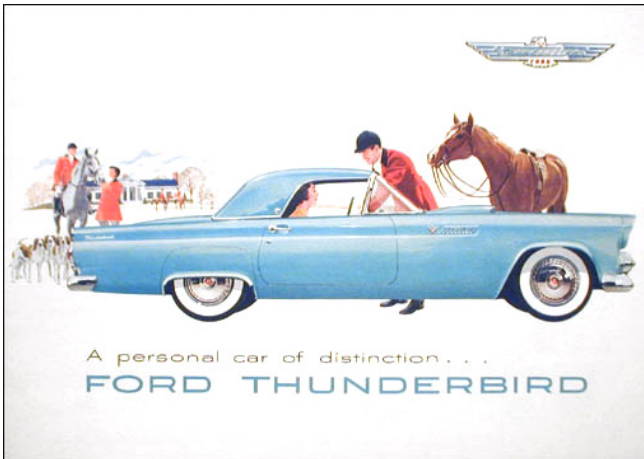

Ford for 1955

A totally new car for the speed-sport fan, the young at heart, and the person who wanted something different, that was the Thunderbird, brought out late in 1954. The car was rumoured to be America's answer to the European domination of the sports car scene, but any thoughts along this line were just wishful thinking. Because of its large engine alone, it would have had to run against Ferraris and other such exotic machines. Ford itself referred to the vehicle as "a personal car" and left the sports car idea strictly to the individual owner's imagination.



Despite the attention gained by the T-Bird, the regular Ford line consisted of what were probably the best looking cars since 1940. The styling was clean, long, and low looking, and showed definite influences of the T-Bird, or vice-versa. Offered were a total of 15 models. The Crest line designation was dropped, and was replaced by the Fairlane, with six models plus station wagons in this range. Two V-8s were offered, one with 162 hp, the other with 182. Also available was the six, now at 120 hp.

In 1955 Ford again updated the range, something required if they were to continue to compete with Chevrolet. The underpinnings were pretty much taken from the '52 Ford's, however the wonderful "Mileage Maker" straight 6 engine was bumped up to 223 ci (3.7 litres) for 120 hp (89 kW) and the new-for-1954 Y-block V8 was now offered in two sizes: Standard Fords used a 272 ci (4.5 litre) version with 162 hp (121 kW), but the large 292 ci (4.8 litre) unit from the Thunderbird was also offered, boasting 193 hp (144 kW).

Apart from the engine changes, customers were sure to notice the new "Fairlane" top-line trim, while a new "Crown Victoria" style featured a chrome "basket handle" across the familiar (and continued) "Victoria" hardtop roof. The company now boasted three different rooflines, the tall two-pillar Mainline, Customline, and Fairlane, lower chrome-pillar Crown Victoria, and pillarless hardtop Victoria.

The "Skyliner" acrylic glass roof was still offered, this time only on the Crown Victoria model. For the first time, Ford customers could purchase their new cars with air conditioning. The system included a condenser unit in the

trunk, plus a pair of air ducts in the trunk and clear tubes which run from the rear package shelf into the headliner, where one found the air ducts. The system was very costly and few units were sold.

The egg-crate grille featured on the 1955 cars was widened into a series of rectangles for 1956. For Australian's however, the line up was restricted to the four-door sedan, locally designed Mainline Utility and Station Wagon.

The Fords introduced for 1955 also featured the panoramic windshields found on Buick's, Oldsmobile's and Cadillac's the previous year. With the panoramic windshield the A-pillars have a vertical angle, this gives the driver more panoramic visibility. For the first time, Ford also offered seat belts as an option.



The Fairlane Sunliner Convertible, \$2,325.

At the top of the list was the Fairlane Crown Victoria Skyliner, with its transparent top. It sold for \$2,375, but was not very popular.




The Fairlane Tudor Club Sedan, at \$2,015. All Fairlane had two engine and three transmission options.




The Fairlane Victoria Hardtop was the lowest priced of these Fairlane hardtops offered. It sold for \$2,195.




The Crestline series was succeeded this year by the Fairlane series, of which the Fordor Town Sedan was the most popular car. It sold for \$2,060 in basic form.




The Country Squire Wagon was the prestige vehicle of the wagon line at \$2,495.



The Country Sedan offered wagon versatility at car prices. It sold for \$2,380, and helped make the station wagon design popular as a family auto.



The Ranch Wagon was a popular economy wagon at \$2,145.



The Custom Ranch Wagon was a decorated version of the plain wagon, and sold for \$2,210.



The Courier Sedan Delivery (left) retained its popularity and sold for \$1,725.00. Purchasers of the Customline Tudor had a choice two engines and three transmissions. With a 6 cylinder engine and standard transmission it sold for \$1,910.00. The Customline Fordor offered mid stream economy at \$1,945. The Mainline Business Coupe sold for \$1,710 & the Mainline Fordor for \$1,885
